The Kinnelon War Memorial Thomas Kline, Borough Historian August 2025

The history of the Kinnelon War Memorial was brought to the attention of the Borough Historian by Councilman Eric Harriz. An investigation into the origins of the memorials was conducted.

Prior to 1922 when the Borough of Kinnelon was incorporated, any memorial of area soldiers would have been undertaken in Pequannock Township and also in the neighboring Borough of Butler. (During World War II Morris Kinney donated Ivy to be planted around Butler's Spanish American War Memorial.)

World War II would be the first American conflict in which citizens from Kinnelon Borough would have been involved. During the war a "Roll of Honor" was erected at the school which depicted those who were actively serving. (Figure 1) Shortly after the conclusion of World War II, In May 1948, the George P. Siek Tri Borough Post 8096 of the V.F.W. presented a bronze tablet naming area soldiers who been killed during the war. Three identical tablets were produced and presented, one each, to the three Tri-Boro towns; Kinnelon, Butler, & Bloomingdale as part of the 1948 Memorial Day Celebrations. (Figure 2) This bronze tablet was likely mounted to a large stone in front of the school, where it lived for many years. (Figure 3.) Walter Coombs and Arthur Smyth were the two deceased Kinnelon soldiers listed on the tablet. Birth records of these two individuals were requested by Councilman Harriz.

Birth Record of James Smyth

In 1965, The Borough of Kinnelon purchased a 21.97 acre tract of land from the Kinnelon Board of Education in order to build a new municipal complex consisting of Library, Garage, and Borough Hall. The new complex was completed in 1966. In April 1967, it was announced that the Kinnelon Jaycee's had submitted plans for a war memorial to be erected on the municipal green. As part of the Memorial Day celebration Mayor Walter Nash commented upon the completion of the memorial. A second bronze plaque was presented to the borough (Figure 4). It was at this time that the original VFW Bronze tablet was relocated from the Kiel School to the new location.

At some point between 1967 and 2000 a second semi circular arch, a mirror image of the one installed by the Jaycees was added. The origin of this second structure is unknown. (Figure 5)

It is difficult to understand why, in the period from the original VFW Bronze in 1949 to the present day, that no municipal recognition of Korean or Vietnam war dead was undertaken by the Borough. The only Kinnelon war casualty of the Korea conflict was James Nelson Dorland. Mr. Dorland was commemorated by the erection of a flag pole and memorial tablet at the Smoke Rise North Gate. (Figure 6) For many years the Smoke Rise Sailing Club started their season with the "Peter Kemper Memorial Race". Kemper died immediately following his basic training at the age of 19. The Kemper family had moved from Kinnelon just 4 months prior, so technically a resident of Boonton Township. (Figure 7)




Figure 6 Dorland Memorial Tablet at Smoke Rise North Gate

The Vietnam War saw the deaths of two Kinnelon soldiers; Jay T. Dandurand and Vincent L. Jacobs, both graduates of Kinnelon High School. Memorial tablets for these two soldiers can be found near the high school flagpole. (Figures 8, 9 & 10)



Recruit, 19, Dies at Ft. Dix, Services Today

BOONTON — Services were to be held today at 2 p.m. in St. John's Episcopal Church for John Peter Kemper, 19, of Split Rock Rd., Rockaway Valley, Boonton Tshp., who died Thursday at Fort Dix, where he was to have completed 16 weeks of basic training Saturday.

Young Kemper was found unconscious in his bunk and was dead on arrival at the base hospital. The Army did not reveal the cause of death.

The youth was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jackson Kemper. He was born in Reading, Pa., and had lived in Glen Ridge and Smoke Rise, Kinnelon, until four months ago when the family moved to Rockaway Valley. He attended Glen Ridge schools, Carteret School and Butler High School and was graduated last June from Kent School, South Kent, Conn.

He was on the varsity football team at Kent, played forward for the Lakeland Raiders of the Garden State Amateur Hockey Association and served as an acolyte at St. John's Church.

Last August he enlisted for three years and was scheduled to attend a paratrooper school at Fort Campbell, Ky., after his Christmas furlough.

His father is president of the Watson-Stillman Press Division of Farrell Birmingham Co. Inc., in Roselle, and vice president of H. K. Porter Co. of Pittsburgh.

Surviving besides his parents are two brothers, Jackson Jr., a student at Kent School, and William F. at home; his paternal grandparents, the Rev. and Mrs. W. P. Kemper of New York and his maternal grandmother. Mrs. Heister H. Muhlenberg of Reading.

In 2001 the current war memorial was constructed as part of the larger facilities project which included the enlargement of the municipal building, library and renovation of the old Kiel School. At a Mayor & Council meeting held on April 19, 2001 a change order detailing various aspects of the project included a line item of \$15,000 for construction of the war monument. At the May 2001 Council Meeting, Facilities Chairman Bud LaMarca commented that the new memorial will be utilized for Memorial Day. At the July 2001 Council meeting an additional change order noted \$1780 for plants around memorial. The new concept was likely designed by Donald Terry, a Kinnelon resident, who was the principal architect for the entire facilities program. (Mr. Terry passed away in 2015). A borough wide newsletter was distributed in Summer 2001 which included an image of the newly constructed memorial (Figure 11).





Figure 12 September 11 2001 memorial tablet installed in 2004

After the new monument was erected a bronze tablet was installed honoring those Kinnelon residents or former residents that were killed as a result of the terror attack that occurred on September 11, 2001. James Martello, Mathew Yarnell and Seth Morris were named on a plaque that was created by 17 year old Greg Carafello and dedicated on the monument at a ceremony held on December 5, 2004. (Figure 12)

Jonathan Batista was killed in Afghanistan on July 8th 2012. A bronze memorial tablet in his honor was installed as part of the Memorial Day activities in May 2013. (Figure 13)

The current condition of the monument was documented in May 2025. (Figure 14) Shortly thereafter the monument erected in 2001 was removed. The plants were removed and the ground leveled as seen in current conditions photo. (Figure 15)

(Continued from Page 25) draw up plans for the reconstruction of Stonehouse Road. Funds for this improvement will come out of capital surplus.


Councilman Glenn Sisco reported that the Kinnelon Jaycee's, as a community service project, have submitted plans for a memorial to honor Kinnelon's war dead. The memorial, to be located in front of the Muncipal Building, will be two feet high and one foot, four inches wide; to be constructed of bricks matching the building and have a flagstone top. The council voted to authorize the memorial, expressing gratitude to the Jaycee's

Sisco also reported that member of the Kinnelon Police Association and the recreation committee conducted sound tests in the rear of the Municipal Complex property where they wish to build a rifle and pistol range. The council moved that the recreation committee draw up plans for the range and submit them for further consideration.

Set Speed Limits

Approval of Ordinance 267, establishing speed limits of several borough roads, has been received from the State Department of Transportation. The limits established are: Fayson Lakes Road, 35 miles per hour; Cutlass Road, 35 miles per hour; all Smoke Rise roads, 30 miles per hour; and Ricker Road, 30 miles per hour.

The mayor and council went on record as being in approval of a land trade between the borough and Joseph Paterno. The borough wishes to acquire 10 feet of Paterno's property to enable it to widen Kiel Avenue at the turn-off into the Meadetown Shopping Center. The motion was passed with the provisos that all easement rights shall be retained by the borough and that no building be allowed on

A four-year U.S. Marine Corps veteran from Kinnelon has been killed in a helicopter crash in Vietnam.

The victim was 1st Lt. Vincent Jacobs, 23, of Fayson Lakes Road, Kinnelon. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Jacobs, of Kinnelon, and the husband of Mrs. Susan M. Jacobs, of Mount Arlington.

Lt. Jacobs was graduated from Kinnelon High School in 1965. He played freshman and varsity football and was classroom representative in his senior year.

Lt. Jacobs was known for his skill as a scuba diver, hunter and water skier. He was also active in the Police Athletic League. After graduation, he joined the Marine Corps and went to Officer's Candidate School. He was graduated as a helicopter pilot.

According to Marine sources, Lt. Jacobs was killed in a helicopter crash some months ago. He had been listed as missing. His body was recovered last week.

Lt. Jacobs was the first serviceman from Kinnelon to lose his life in the Vietnam war.

Born in Kankakee, Illinois, Dandurand was the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Dandurand of 13 White Birch Terrace and initially came to the borough in 1964.

He received his primary edu-

He received his primary edu-He received his primary edu-cation in Kankakee but gradu-ated in 1966 from Kinnelon High School where he attained a high academic rating and had also been active in the marching band.

Dandurand later improved on his musical talents by entering Newark State College where he was chrolled as a music major prior to entering the service.

The Dandurand family resided a brief time in Memphis, Tennessee after coming here in

Tennessee after coming here in 1964 but returned permanent-ly in August of 1969. The vic-tim's father is plant manager at the Armour-Dian Co., Clif-ton

ton.

The survivors include a sigter, Jane, an 11-year-old pupil at the Stoneybrook School, and two brothers, Mark, 23 and Randy 17. The older brother is a Vietnam veteran and graduate of Southern Illinois University while the other is a senior at Kinnelon High School.

Ironically, the family learned just two days before the death that Dandurand had been recommended for a Distinguished

Sept. 11 Memorial dedicated to fallen

Though it is said that time heals all wounds, some wounds may never completely heal. The community will never forget the victims of the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001 and a plaque has been dedicated in their memory on the grounds of the municipal building.

The plaque installation was a personal project for Greg Carafello, 17. His dad's closest friend, Jimmy Martello, a 1978 graduate of Kinnelon High School, was killed in the 9/11 attack on the World Trade Center. Carafello wanted a fitting tribute to all three victims, Martello, Seth Morris and Matthew Yarnell, who had lived in Kinnelon and tragically lost their lives in the attack.

"I felt it was the right thing to do," said Greg, who is a junior at Don Bosco. "I asked the mayor what we could do and it was decided that a plaque would serve as a good memorial."

Greg raised the \$400 for the plaque by soliciting donations from local businesses. Taste of Reality Deli, Famularo's Deli, Kinnelon Country Wines & Liquors, Puddingstone Market and Leoscorp Variety Store made the creation of the plaque possible. The Borough Department of Works installed the plaque at the war memorials on the green at Borough Hall.

At the Dec. 5 dedication service, Greg read a poem from an unknown author that he felt was apropos. The poem was entitled, "The Measure of a Man."

The Measure of a Man

Not - "How did he die?" But - "How did he live?"

Not – "What did he gain?" But – "What did he give?"

These are the units to measure the worth

Of a man as a man, regardless of birth.

Not – "What was his station? But – "Had he a heart?"

And – "How did he play his God-given part?

Was he ever ready with a word of good cheer?

To bring back a smile, to banish a tear?"

prayer from Msgr. Joseph Goode of Our Lady of the Magnificat R.C. Church. Fr. Goode referenced Ecclesiastes 3:1-2 "for everything there is a season." Fr. Goode spoke of remembering Jimmy, Matthew and Seth for their gift of love and said comfort can be taken in the fact that the three are gathered in the palm of God's hand.

Mayor Glenn Sisco said a young man, who wanted a proper place to put the three Kinnelon men's names, where they could be viewed in perpetuity, approached him. There was some brainstorming before the plaque idea materi-

alized, he indicated.

"There is a common sadness. As time goes on, it heals a lot of things. Some healing maybe never takes place. We care and share as a com-

munity," said Sisco.

The plaque bears an image of the Kinnelon Colt, which is a symbol all three men had ties to. Yarnell and Martello were both Kinnelon High School (KHS) graduates. The colt is the symbol of Kinnelon public school sports teams and recreation department teams. Matthew Yarnell was on the KHS ski team and was a National Merit Scholar at KHS, a distinction achieved by only the brightest of students. Seth Morris was a Kinnelon Recreation Department soccer clinic coach, inline hockey coach and girl's softball coach. Jimmy Martello was a star linebacker for the KHS football team and received a full scholarship to the University of Tennessee in Chattanooga. He also played basketball at KHS.

The plaque bears the three men's names and the words:

"To honor the innocent men of Kinnelon, who perished in the sinful acts of terrorist on Sept. 11, 2001. May all you have given to the town be remembered and cherished."

After the ceremony, Matthew's mother, Michele acknowledged that the pain of the loss of here son will never go completely away, but Debbie Walsh's e-mail address is had praise for Greg's efforts.

"Greg did a great job with the plaque. It was a very nice thing to do and what was especially great about it was that a kid did it. It was a well-conducted service. Mayor Sisco did a great job. He has always shown such great interest in the people of this town."

Lynn Morris Piccolo, Seth's wife, also acknowledged Greg's

efforts.

"I think it was a lovely tribute to Seth and the other victims. The plaque was beautiful," she said.

Scholarships are named for each of the three victims at KHS. Lynn Morris Piccolo said two KHS graduating seniors are awarded a \$5,000 Seth Morris Heroes Foundation scholarship annually. The scholarships are awarded to students, who demonstrate academic achievement and community service.

"I look for students, who give back to the community in any way. I receive beautiful paragraphs from students who tell me what they have done for their community. I am amazed by the quality of the students at KHS," she said.

Michele Yarnell said many youngsters have benefited by the Matthew D. Yarnell Scholarship and that continued donations are appreciated. Students may check the KHS guidance department for the criteria used to award the scholarship.

The James Martello Memorial Scholarship Fund is awarded to a student athlete that displays the type of drive and dedication Martello exhibited while at KHS.

Marianne Sticker, guidance department supervisor at KHS, said all three scholarships remain active. Donations to all three scholarship funds can be mailed to KHS at 121 Kinnelon Rd., Kinnelon, NJ 07405.

"These scholarships are awarded to students who are involved in community service. The recipients serve as good role models for younger students because all three

of these scholarships are named for men who were outstanding community members," said Stricker.


